GEORGE LONG PREACHING SERIES GUEST SPEAKER, THURMAN WILLIAMS

Dr. Thurman Williams serves as the Director of Homiletics at Covenant Theological Seminary in St. Louis. He also is the planter and Associate Pastor of New City Fellowship – West End, also in St. Louis. He previously served as Associate Pastor at Grace & Peace Fellowship (PCA) in St. Louis, MO, from 2013 to 2018. Thurman has been married to his lovely wife, Evie, since 1997 and they have been blessed with four beautiful children (now adults): Charvez, Shaquana, Joshua, and Caleb. Thurman served on the PCA's Mission to North America Committee from 2003–2021, including as chairman in 2018–2021. He currently serves on the boards of Covenant College, The Carver Project, and The Freedom School (St. Louis) and the Missouri Presbytery's Credentials Committee.



GEORGE LONG PREACHING SERIES

The George Long Preaching Series was established by the LMPC Session in 2001 as an annual reminder of our Savior's faithful use of his holy Word in our midst that has never and will never 'return to him void, but will accomplish the purpose for which it was sent' (Isaiah 55:11). This series also brings honor to God for his blessings bestowed upon LMPC through the ministry of Dr. George W. Long, who served as pastor through a season of spiritual renewal in the 1970s and 80s, calling LMPC back to the primacy of God's Word. In the front cover of his Bible, Dr. Long wrote, "This book has kept me from being lost. May I never, in any sense, lose it." By the grace of God, this series will be used to annually root us in the authority, sufficiency, clarity, and necessity of Scripture. Dr. Long died in 2016.
